Return of the Kanadier:

A History Conference on a Migrant People October 3-October 5, 2002

This is an academic conference examining the history of the immigration and integration of Low German-speaking Kanadier Mennonites from Paraguay, Mexico and other Latin American countries into Canada. These migrants are the descendants of Mennonites who left Manitoba and Saskatchewan in the 1920's because of the schools question. During the last generation some 40,000 have returned to places across Canada and in several states in the U.S. Here

they have transplanted their family life, rebuilt churches, and learned new skills. In the process they have had to face the difficult decision of leaving an old home and the dynamic challenges of finding a new community and integrating into a new state and society. It is our hope to pur special attention to the accomplishments of these recent Mennonite Immigrants and the hardles they faced as they integrated into Canada.
